Jeanette Dippo American Foundation for Suicide Prevention **Jeanette Dippo's** life changed in 2006 when her daughter Kim, a successful physician in Minneapolis, took her own life. She learned that the need of survivors was to be "held" by family and community. They also want to make peace with the absence of the loved one, as they didn't get the chance to say goodbye. They want to honor the life of the deceased and find redemption in the loss. In doing so they feel productive and "normal" again.

The prominent theme to survivors is "why". Suicide is the perfect storm of trauma, relief, sorrow, anxiety, PTSD, and asynchrony. Suicide knows no race barrier, income level, or any walk of life.

Jeanette explained that the closer you are to someone, the bigger the impact. Mothers have the highest rate of suicide after a suicide, and fathers have the second largest rate. She described a survivor of suicide as one who has a high level of perceived psychological, social, or physical distress.

She handed us cards to put in our wallets which alert us to signs of possible suicidal tendencies. There is an official number to call for info and alerting about suicides—988.

We thank Jeanette for being our Speaker today; she has lived through the worst nightmare imaginable, and instead of cowering she has found a renewed purpose.



Whether you have struggled with suicide yourself or have lost a loved one, know you are not alone. Hear about personal experiences from people in your local community whose lives have been impacted by suicide.
