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I would like to share with you that our district finance committee agreed to donate \$5,000 to District 6960 to help with the clean up in the area devastated by Hurricane Ian. This is another example of Rotarians making a difference in their communities, whether directly or indirectly. Here is the link to this effort headed by D6960: RotaryFL.org

November is the month that Rotary focuses on the importance of the Foundation. We should be proud to be a Rotarian and the difference our Foundation makes in the world and all of this is a direct result of your generosity with your donations. Here are the 2021-22 numbers:

- PolioPlus program awards, including PolioPlus Partners grants, totaled \$152.9 million.
- Approved 2,066 Global Grants and program awards totaled \$130.0 million.
- Approved 467 District Grants and program awards totaled \$31.1 million.
- Approved 55 Disaster Response Grants and program awards totaled \$3.1 million.
- Rotary Peace Centers 117 fellows from 63 countries began their studies at the Rotary Peace Centers, and program awards for the fellows and centers totaled \$4.4 million.
- Programs of Scale grants The member-led Partners for a Malaria-Free Zambia program was awarded the 2020-21 grant of \$2 million, which was matched by \$4 million in funding from our partners.

Good afternoon fellow Rotarians. I truly hope today is a better day than yesterday and tomorrow will be better than today. I am proudly forwarding the following message on behalf of the District 6960 Disaster Relief Committee. As you have seen, the communities in our district sustained catastrophic damage in the wake of Hurricane Ian. I am thankful that D6960 has a district Relief Committee who, in conjunction with too many Rotarians to list, hit the ground running with conference calls twice daily, at 7:45 am and 5:00 pm, which started last Monday September 26, 2022. Sikora still lives in Cortland and is the son of Peruvian and American parents. He began studying the piano when he was 6 and started composing at 9 years of age. He graduated from Queens College in 2012 and was then invited to attend Samuel Adler's summer semester for young composers at the Free University of Berlin. He graduated from Binghamton University with a Masters in Music in 2014. At 16, Sikora won a national prize for his art song "The Shadow Rose" and was invited to attend a performance of his work at the National Association for Music Education's National Conference in Milwaukee (Wisconsin). While in Milwaukee, he met Maurice Peress, who later became his conducting and composition teacher at Queens College.

During his studies and through his 20's, Sikora's career was largely a private one. In late 2020, he started a YouTube channel, and within a year, his videos had received over 300,000 views. Sikora then began playing the piano in public more regularly, with programs consisting of his own work, as well as pieces by colleagues and improvisations. Sikora made his professional performance debut with the Ukrainian Festival Orchestra at the Lviv Organ Hall. Sikora continues to perform in recitals and with orchestras throughout the United States and Europe.





Ithaca Noon Rotary

The Rotary Club of Ithaca has awarded nearly \$15,000 in grants to 15 community nonprofits, more than tripling the amount of funding the club donated in the program ten years ago.

Projects that received grants include recreating a mural of the Underground Railroad beneath the Green Street bridge, teaching homeschooled youth the art of magic and training disabled residents to work with animals at local farms and veterinarians. "It is clear that there is a



great need in our area and through these Rotary grants, organizations can improve the quality of life for the people in the community they serve," said Robert Gravani, a Rotary member who cochaired the project.

Rotary Club members raised \$10,000 for the grants program by making donations at weekly club meetings. An anonymous donor also pledged a matching \$5,000 gift for the program. "These grants help our local agencies meet their missions," said Kelly Buck, a Rotary member who also cochaired the program. "And we try and spread out Rotary grant money across a range of needs."

The annual program provides grants of up to \$1,000 to community organizations evaluated by a six-member committee. The agencies that were selected to receive funding were honored at a presentation at the Rotary Club on October 5.

Feed My Starving Children Mobile Pack





- a. monitored changes in the path of Hurricane Ian that put D6960 at the center of the anticipated Hurricane Ian
- b. moved all of the District's Disaster Relief Trailers out of harm's way
- c. put a plan into place to reach out to members and assess needs
- d. built a web page for needs assessments and donations on RotaryFL.org.

Stage 3: Wednesday September 28, 2022-Thursday September 29, 2022:

- a. went live with a web page for needs assessments and donations on RotaryFL.org.
- b. addressed 400 attendees at the Zone 33/34 Impact Summit in Baltimore comprising all district leaders for the
- 31 districts in Zones 33/34, zone leaders as well as RI leadership. Made a plea for monetary and supplies assistance for D6960's relief effort with a very positive response
- c. started reaching out to members to assess Rotarians' needs as well as needs in our communities
- d. continued fundraising efforts

Stage 4: Friday September 30, 2022 to the Present Day:

- a. start deployment of disaster relief trailers
- b. continued reaching out to members to assess Rotarians' needs as well as needs in our communities
- c. started creating partnerships and continued partnerships for disaster relief efforts
- d. made available district funds to start funding relief efforts, applied for District Disaster Relief grants in partner-ship with other districts to maximize our fundraising as well as relief through RI.


